

President's Message By: Grace Boehm, Board President



I apologize for the confusion at the beginning of the last Board meeting with the new microphone system. We are trying to make the Zoom experience better for residents who join the meeting remotely. We thought we had tested it and had the bugs worked out, but that wasn't the case and we reverted to the wired microphone for last night's meeting. We will perform a broader test before the next meeting.

Bank accounts have been opened at the new bank (Centennial) and most of our operating funds have been transferred to the new bank. The old bank accounts will remain open so there is no change to how you pay your quarterly dues at this time. Funds will be transferred from the old bank to the new bank as deposits are made. Some residents will have to make changes to how you pay your dues when you make payment for January dues.

The Truck Task Force, which had been working on a clear definition of a truck, reported they are at an impasse and don't expect to be able to reach an agreed upon definition of a truck. The Board voted to approve their request to be relieved of their responsibilities. Pick up truck parking restrictions will be considered at the July Board meeting.

The Board approved a proposal from the Landscape Committee to add shrubs to the center median near Sabal Lake Circle, at a cost of \$988. Another proposal from the Landscape Committee, to remove pepper trees behind Glade Fern Court, was tabled so the Landscape Committee can consider trimming the pepper trees rather than removing them. 

From the **"Watchdog"**!

I recently received a toll violation via text message for a car we keep in CA for \$4.67.

It gave a web site (bayareafastrakservices.com) to pay the toll and avoid extra charges. The violation was supposedly in the Bay Area where neither our car nor I have been for forty years.

I pulled up the web site and it had the legitimate logo, all the same info, even made me jump through several hoops to verify I was not a robot. They, of course, wanted my credit card # to resolve the issue.

I researched the 709 area code to discover it was in Canada. Next I researched the internet for The Toll Roads (also known as "fasttrak) for any scams. Sure enough, there it was, the new scam for toll violations for the Bay Area.

People, **BEWARE**! Just a matter of time before it infects our SunPass system.

Always look for small things when receiving from anyone or business a request for money.

Check for misspellings, improper punctuation, language mistakes, (in my case the dollar sign was put after the amount, 4.67\$), **and always, always do your homework**.




From The West Corner Of...

Before the 19th century, photography did not exist, so people who wanted a lasting image of their home, their family, or themselves had to have one painted, sculpted, or drawn. In the early 1800s, inventors in France and England were at the center of the effort to create photographic representations of objects and people. In France, Joseph Nicéphore Niépce stunned the world in 1827 when he released what is believed to be the first photograph ever taken, titled "View from the Window at Le Gras." Niépce rendered the image using a camera obscura combined with a lightsensitive metal plate, a process he called heliography. Despite its success, the heliograph required several days of exposure to capture the scene, eliminating the opportunity to photograph any people who may have been on the street.



In 1829, Niépce met artist and printmaker Louis-Jacques-Mandé Daguerre. Each man was familiar with the other's work. Niépce admired Daguerre's rotating diorama that had captivated Parisian audiences in 1822. Daguerre, like Niépce, saw the potential of improving upon the camera obscura to create clear and permanent images. They entered into a business partnership that resulted in the creation of the daguerreotype, an innovative photographic process that required only four to five minutes of exposure.

The quicker shutter speed allowed Daguerre's camera to capture an image never seen before: a photo of a human being. In 1838, he debuted a daguerreotype of a street scene on the Boulevard du Temple in Paris. In the lower left corner of the photo we can see a man having his shoes shined; remaining stationary allowed him to be included in the photo, something that would have been impossible using the multiple-day exposure that heliographs required.

This anonymous stranger on Boulevard du Temple was not simply the subject of the world's <u>first candid photograph</u> — he's also believed to be the first human being ever photographed.
