Turtle Talk October 2024

President's Message By: Grace Boehm, Board President



The big news from the Board meeting is that Turtle Rock and Civix have mutually agreed to terminate our relationship effective December 31, 2024. The Board is moving quickly to interview and hire a new management company. We expect to have a decision quickly – before the end of this month so look for announcements and details as the month unfolds.

Last night, we reviewed five funding requests. They were all approved: Replacing damaged and dangerous grates for two outfall boxes (\$2,180), Removing a large floating island behind Brooksbend Circle that resulted from Hurricane Debby (\$2,137.50), Emergency repairs to the South Gate guard booth air conditioning system (\$1,082.70). Two proposals to improve entry to the community were also approved: Replacing all gate arms at all entrance and exit lanes (\$5,074.40) and replacing the inoperable call box at the South Gate (\$2,022.00). The South Gate call box will be replaced when a camera is installed to allow the North Gate attendant to validate ID. This camera is expected to cost less than \$500 to purchase and install. These gate improvements are separate from the Gate Access Task Force improvements. The repairs will improve the access experience while the Task Force completes its important work. The goal is for the new gates to be compatible with the longer term solution.

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Board meetings will be held the LAST Thursday of each month starting at 6:30pm during 2024. President's Message continued.

The Board also approved engaging Cavanaugh & Co for the 2024 Financial Audit. Curt Gilroy was appointed as the Board Liaison to the Nominating Committee. Members were appointed to the Nominating Committee: Patty Fleming, Dodie Neuhauser, Megan Pohl and Kim Weiser. Thank you to everyone who volunteers to help out in so many capacities. Finally, to be in compliance with Florida Statute 720's new requirements, the Board adopted the **Board Member Conflict of Interest Disclosure Policy. Each Board** Member will be required to document any conflicts of interest and those signed documents will be maintained by the Association.

The Board meeting dates for October, November and December were changed to accommodate holidays.

The new dates are October 17, November 21 and December 19.

We hope to see you at the October Board meeting on October 17th at 6:30PM.



Mosquito Awareness

While mosquitoes are often an issue in Florida, recent wet weather including Tropical Storm Debby has created additional problems.

Florida Department of Health in Sarasota County has issued a mosquito-borne illness advisory, which is expected to last until the end of the year. The county uses "sentinel chickens" to test for viruses spread by mosquitoes. Three of the Sarasota County chickens recently tested positive for West Nile virus. According to a news release from Sarasota County Mosquito Management Service, "Staff are continuing their normal daily surveillance and larvicide treatments to manage the mosquito population. Completion of missions will be weather permitting."

In addition to West Nile virus, Florida's mosquitoes can transmit Eastern equine and St. Louis encephalitis. "Non-native" mosquitoes inadvertently brought in by international travelers can also transmit malaria, dengue fever, chikungunya fever, yellow fever, and Rift Valley fever. Symptoms of these illnesses can be mild or severe.

Residents should empty any stagnant pools of water on their property. When outdoors, consider wearing clothes that cover your arms and legs, using insect repellent, and being mindful that early mornings and early evenings are the times when mosquitoes are most active.

If you become aware of a proliferation of mosquitoes or a standing water problem in your neighborhood, please contact Sarasota County Mosquito Management by applying for service at <u>https://sarasota.leateamapps.com/PublicSR/</u> or by dialing 311 for more information. If you have been bitten by a mosquito and feel ill, call your health care provider as soon as possible.

Why Do You Cry When You Cut Onions?

There's no need to cry over spilled milk, but what about chopped onions? You can thank a chemical combination of enzymes and sulfur for the tears that well up while you make dinner.

Onions use sulfur to make a mixture of amino acids and enzymes during the growing process. The acids and enzymes are separated and stored in different regions of the onion's cells, which are called vacuoles. While the onion remains whole, the amino acids and enzymes in the onion's cells remain separated. Once you cut into the onion, however, everything mixes together. When the two substances are combined, they form a chemical known as syn-Propanethial-S-oxide, or lachrymatory factor (LF). LF is an irritant that's easily vaporized when it reacts with the air.

LF isn't strong enough to affect tougher parts of your body such as your skin, but it can irritate more sensitive regions. As the vapors waft up toward your face, your eyes will begin to sting. Your body — sensing the irritant — will release a torrent of tears in an attempt to wash the chemicals from your eyes. Luckily, LF can't do any serious damage, even in high quantities.

Producing LF is the onion's way of <u>defending against</u> anything that may want to eat it. As soon as an animal bites into the root, its eyes start to burn and it's reminded to stay away from onions. Unfortunately for onions, humans are persistent.

Hurricane Names

Until the 1940s, hurricanes in the U.S. were generally referred to simply by the year and/or place they occurred, such as the "Great Miami Hurricane of 1926." That changed during World War II, when Navy and Air Force meteorologists began to name the tropical storms they tracked after their girlfriends and wives for easier reference. For a time, the U.S. military also experimented with naming storms after its phonetic alphabet — Able, Baker, Charlie, and so on — but this was replaced with a system thought to be less confusing and easier for the public to remember. In 1954, the National Weather Bureau chose to use women's names as the standard for hurricanes; that year saw Alice, Barbara, Carol, and others.

But why women's names, specifically? The decision was partially inspired by the trend that began during the war, though it was also rooted in sexist stereotypes about the temperamental nature of women. The practice continued in the U.S. until the 1970s, when members of the women's movement spoke out against the negative characterization of women that pervaded every facet of society, including storm-naming. In 1979, the National Weather Service and the World Meteorological Association changed the naming convention to include an even split of women's names, using six groups of 26 names that rotate annually.
